We have reviewed membership of our working groups and updated details will be published on our website.

This is the first edition of the newsletter that has been produced since David Lamont left the council and relinquished his role as newsletter editor and coordinator. Producing the newsletter is not as straightforward as one might think and I am grateful to Ian Fullerton for agreeing to step in as interim editor. It is quite a complex task and we ask for your understanding in case of any hiccups as we get to grips with the process. We have also asked contributors to submit their copy a little earlier than usual, so please appreciate that articles for this edition may have been written in July for publication mid-September.

As reported on the front page, I am delighted that the Riseley Village Tea Room remains in capable and experienced hands. My thanks to Pam for her commitment to the Tea Room over the last ten years and for building it up to the amazing success it is today. I wish her well in retirement.

The council is delighted to have made arrangements which will allow our wonderful community pre-school to offer afternoon and lunchtime sessions in addition to its previous morning provision. These extended hours are much in demand by local families.

The parish council continues to challenge

the planning application, from Croudace Homes, to build 81 homes on the land west of Trowes Lane and north of Charlton Lane. We are closely monitoring its progress and will have a further opportunity to reiterate our objections when their application is considered by WBC's planning committee. At the time of writing, we don't know when that will be.

June was a record month for high temperatures and fine weather after a wetter than normal spring. The allotment association held their open morning in May and we saw a number of gardens opened up as part of the National Garden Scheme.

Other events included the church fête which was held on the Swallowfield recreation ground in early June. Despite the weather, it was a great success. The Farley Hall Horse Trials took place in Swallowfield Park in late June, providing entertainment for local residents who were able to watch the competitions free of charge. In July the Russell Players put on a polished performance of "Mitigating Circumstances" in the Parish Hall.

I hope you have all had a pleasant summer as we enter the season of mellow fruitfulness.

What you ought to know about planning



Every planning application in England is evaluated in the context of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), a set of guidelines designed to protect the environment, to promote sustainable growth and to simplify the planning system. Our local planning authority, Wokingham Borough Council (WBC), has developed a set of plans and policies that adapt the NPPF to local conditions. The result is a long-term Strategic Plan, a set of Core Policies and several subsidiary plans, including Neighbourhood Plans, as discussed below. WBC's local plan is available online, is currently being updated and can be viewed here: https://www.wokingham.gov.uk/planning-policy/planning-policy-information/local-plan-update/.

These plans are the background against which WBC planning officers, or in more substantial cases the Planning Committee, reach decisions to approve or refuse a planning application. Your local parish council is informed about, reviews and comments on every planning application affecting the parish, including those related to properties close to our boundary in neighbouring parishes. It is essential to recognise that your parish council cannot approve or refuse any planning application! In the future, and subject to creation of a Swallowfield Neighbourhood Plan, we may hope to further influence the planning officer's decision process, but we will never be able to override it.

Every planning application is open to view and comment on by members of the public and we encourage you to do so. Please understand, however, that it is the quality of comments rather than their quantity that will carry most weight with the planning officers, and only comments that address relevant planning issues will be considered.

As an example, consider the recent application from Croudace Homes to build 81 properties on land immediately south of Swallowfield Village. Your parish council worked with community leaders to communicate a list of key planning concerns to all our parishioners. Your response was amazing - nearly 400 well considered objections were submitted highlighting valid conflicts with planning policy. Further, your parish council submitted a detailed rebuttal (>10 pages), opposing the application and addressing both local concerns and conflicts with planning policy. To date there has been no response from WBC to this application, but we will continue to challenge it and keep you informed.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

In 2011, the Localism Act introduced the concept of a 'Neighbourhood Plan', a plan that applies guidance for planning officers but at a much more local level than the Borough plans. It must support the overall aims of the Borough's development plans, but applies only to applications from within a limited geographical area, or 'neighbourhood', typically an individual parish.

A Neighbourhood Plan sets out planning policies which, taken together with Borough level policies, are used to determine local planning applications. Unlike Borough level plans, a Neighbourhood Plan is developed by the local community, in our case the Parish of Swallowfield including Riseley and Farley Hill, by local people who know and love the area. Its primary purpose is to help the community get the right kind of development, in the right place. Once a Neighbourhood Plan is approved, the Local Planning Authority must take it into account in making planning decisions. Creating a neighbourhood plan for Swallowfield Parish

Creating a Neighbourhood Plan is a substantial undertaking. Yet in late 2022, the Parish Council decided it would be appropriate to develop a 'Swallowfield, Riseley & Farley Hill Neighbourhood Plan' and asked WBC to register the Parish as a 'Designated Area' for this purpose.

To develop the plan, we need to form a project team of volunteers from throughout the Parish. We need participants with a range of skills including planning, green environment, communication, admin, report drafting, etc. The team will set aims, develop evidence bases, identify local needs and development opportunities and, ultimately, draw these together into a plan.

We anticipate that there will be two leads for the team, one Parish Councillor and one Local Community lead, but this may change as terms of reference are developed. We also need to involve residents from all parts of the parish to prepare a coherent sustainable future vision for our community.

SWALLOWFIELD FLOOD RESILIENCE GROUP

Swallowfield Flood Resilience Group (SFRG) was formed following extensive surface water flooding which occurred in the parish in July 2007. Since its formation, members of the group have developed an extensive understanding of the nature of flooding in our area and have helped to implement a series of projects aimed at reducing the risks of future flooding.

SFRG works closely with the parish council, Wokingham Borough Council (WBC), the Environment Agency, the South East Rivers Trust and local landowners. The group's early efforts were focused on clearance of the various ditches and balancing ponds in the parish and,

subsequently, a programme of annual maintenance was established for the council-owned ditches. In February 2020 the parish council, supported by members of SFRG, completed construction of the swale at the end of the recreation ground in Swallowfield. This reduces the risk of property flooding in Swallowfield Street by allowing floodwater to drain from the road directly onto the flood plain. SFRG and the parish council have also worked together to develop further natural flood management proposals and, earlier this year, SFRG provided support to WBC on their successful application for further funding for these projects.

Our group has also prepared a parish emergency plan on behalf of the parish council and has established an emergency response team which will assist residents in the event of future property flooding. Using grant funding from SSE, a range of equipment, including two-way radios, generators and pumps, has been acquired to be used by the team in the event of an emergency.

Despite the triple threat of rampant inflation, increasing needs in the community and continuously low funding from central government, the Borough Council remains committed to sound finances and protecting those people who need us most.

The changes to litter bins, street sweeping, cleaning of areas around bottle banks and weed spraying would save taxpayers about £600,000 over three years and changes to the grass cutting service would mean £100,000 savings per year through reduction of cuts from six to four for grass areas except for play parks and other amenity areas.

However, in our understandable desire to make these necessary changes, we did not follow the correct procedure and we apologise for that.
We will now go through the correct process, which started in August 2023 with a public consultation on how any changes should be implemented."

Greetings gardeners. Thank you so much to those of you who supported our June Open Gardens which raised over £4000 for the NGS Charity.

At headquarters everyone is really busy confirming bookings, sorting replacements, agreeing final sizes for marquees, number of tables, chairs and hundreds of other things including organising all the volunteers who make it work.

Focusing on the horticultural part of our brief, thank goodness we have not had a repeat of last year's prolonged drought. But we have witnessed quite unexpected consequences. Very unusually, most roses came out in huge abundance and all at the same time. This was a stress response, a sort of desperate attempt to ensure they continued through seed or anything. Earlier in the year a lot of spring flowers, particularly tulips, were unusually short stemmed and at times small flowered. The Summer term is always a busy one and it is full of mixed emotions. We say goodbye to the children going on to school in September and wish them well in all their future adventures. Not only do we say goodbye, but we look forward to September and the new children we will be welcoming through our doors. We've already hosted a very successful stay and play session for our new starters and their parents and are now ready for the next one in August before our new term starts.

SWALLOWFIELD ART GROUP

During our last few sessions of the summer term, we studied the work of Georgia O'Keeffe. Born in 1887, O'Keeffe was an American artist who painted nature in a way that showed how it made her feel. She is best known for her paintings of flowers and desert landscapes.

She played an important part in the development of modern art in America, becoming the first female painter to gain respect in New York's art world in the 1920s. Her unique and different way of painting nature, simplifying its shapes and forms and using dramatic colours, made her a pioneer in the field of American Modernism.

We attempted to recreate
O'Keeffe's method of composition
by taking a small section of a
reference photo of a flower and
painting it in a bold and simplified
way that rendered the subject quite
abstract. The two paintings shown
are by members of the group.

Another subject we attempted was to paint sea shells in watercolour in a circular formation. For this we painted various shell shapes in watercolour, using a harmonious colour palette, in a pleasing composition. Creating a three-dimensional feel relied on the use of light and dark to create realistic shadows.

The rest of our time in the summer term was taken up in preparation for the Swallowfield Show, where we are currently hoping for a good turnout in the art marquee and for success in the art section of the horticultural show.

SWALLOWFIELD LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

18th May 2023

Moving forward with our planned Programme Linda Carroll and Steve Thomas took us back to our school days. It was so interesting to hear about one of our well-known local schools: THE HOLT. Both Linda and Steve were teachers at the school so their personal knowledge was clearly expressed as they talked us through their experiences, as well as giving us some history and background of the establishment and development of The Holt. What was particularly interesting was the way in which the pupils and staff continue their connection with the school through various groups and meetings - it was abundantly clear that they thought of The Holt as a 'family' and were keen to continue their involvement and participation.

15th June 2023

A visit to the Ice House on the Farley Hill Estate (which was built in 1790 on land which at the time was part of the Swallowfield Park Estate). It was fascinating to actually stand and see the opening of our local Ice House. Natalie Gaibani welcomed us and gave us some background history about their Ice House.

A few Facts and History of Ice Houses: Ice Houses were introduced into Britain in the 1600s. James I commissioned the first modern Ice House in 1619 in Greenwich Park and another in Hampton Court in 1625–6. An ice house (also known as ice well, ice pits or ice mounds) is a building for storing ice throughout the year. They date from before the invention of electricity and the modern refrigerator. An ice house is usually located partly or completely underground and often built near natural sources of ice in winter like rivers and freshwater lakes. During the winter, ice and snow would be taken into the ice house and insulated against melting with straw or sawdust. It would stay frozen for many months, even until the following winter.

We then went on to All Saints
Church where Barbara Stanley
gave us an interesting, informative
and knowledgeable guided tour
of this beautiful old Church, its
foundations being laid as a Chapel
in 1256 during Norman Times, and
the Graveyard with information
about the more famous gravestones.
The questions and explorations
continued during refreshment time.

Everyone declared it was a really interesting evening, visiting local places of real interest and history.

Our Programme continues on 21st September when we are guests of the George and Dragon and are using their meeting room to hear the History and plans for the future given by Danny Wrathen Sanchez.

Mike Cooper joins us once again on 19th October 2023 to give his talk entitled 'The Abbey & the Castle, Reading in the middle ages' or 'What did the Abbey ever do for us?' We will be back in the Rose Room, Parish Hall, Swallowfield for this presentation.

On the 16th November 2023 we welcome back Richard Hoyle again in the Rose Room at the Parish Hall to continue his Tudor History with Elizabeth 1st – the Tudor Succession.

All meetings start at 8pm and usually take place in The Rose Room at the Parish Hall, Swallowfield (unless otherwise notified to Members, Friends and by Posters displayed throughout the villages.) Do come and join us, you will be most welcome.

WHAT TO DO IN EARLY AUTUMN

September is a month of harvests and tidying up the debris of the finished crops. There isn't much that you can SOW at this time of year, other than winter lettuces, salad leaves, spring onions and spinach but you can PLANT OUT spring cabbage plants, cranberries, over-wintering onion sets and strawberries. Propagate from your own runners, planting the new baby plants into pots but leaving them attached to the mother plant.

HARVEST any remaining onions, leaving them to dry off before storing them in a dry, cool place. Ripen and pick tomatoes. Help them along the way by cutting off all the lower leaves (especially if they are turning yellow). Help pumpkins and squash to ripen by trimming back some leaves. Continue watering and feeding them until harvesting them at the end of the September.

Sweetcorn cobs are usually ready for picking when the silks turn brown or black. Test by peeling back the outer leaves and digging a thumbnail into a kernel. If the juice is milky, not clear, the cob is ready for eating.

Sue, Plot Holder

Jobs for September:

- Cut down asparagus ferns when the leaves turn yellow
- Turn your compost heap with a fork to gerate it
- Feed and trim celeriac
- Sow green manure on cleared beds to prevent weeds from taking over again
- Prune out old blackberry canes and tie in the new ones
- Lift sweet potatoes and turnips
- Pick aubergines while their skins are still glossy
- Check apples, pears and plums for brown rot and destroy infected fruit

LOCAL MEMBER UPDATE

Wokingham Borough Council

Final recommendations for new ward boundaries have been set out. Wokingham Borough Council will soon have new ward boundaries following an independent review by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (see https://www.lgbce.org.uk/all-reviews/wokingham). The review aimed to ensure that each borough councillor will represent approximately the same number of electors and that these arrangements will help the council work effectively.

In its final recommendations the commission concluded that Wokingham residents, should be represented by 54 councillors, the same as at present. There will be 18 three-member wards, including yours, an arrangement that I personally do not agree with. In my view, a rural community such as the current Swallowfield ward, which includes the villages of Swallowfield, Riseley, the southern part of Spencers Wood and Farley Hill, is better served by a single member of the council as at present.

Borough councillors are elected on a four-year cycle. Currently the Borough Council holds elections every four years when all members' seats come up for election at once. The next election is due in May 2024. In future each ward is to be represented by three councillors and the new administration has decided that, starting in May 2025, a third of the seats in each ward will come up for re-election in each of three successive years with no elections taking place in the fourth year. This means holding three elections in each ward instead of just one over a four-year cycle which will add hundreds of thousands of pounds to the cost. My colleagues and I concluded that it would have been preferable to save money during these economically difficult times and retain the current arrangement of elections every four years.

The changes become law once Parliament has approved them and the Council will ensure that the arrangements are in place for the local elections in May 2024. Sadly, I do not believe the residents of our community were fully appraised of these important changes and therefore did not comment. In fact, only 208 people and organisations in the borough made comments to help decide the new wards. Further details can be found on the
