In September last year councillors and residents planted over 1,500 Daffodil bulbs in Farley Hill, Riseley and Swallowfield, provided by the Parish Council. This April we were rewarded with swathes of colour on verges across our parish and we have received many kind comments from people who enjoyed the display. We are pleased to have been able to offer small areas at both Swallowfield and Riseley Recreation Grounds and Swallowfield Meadow in support of Wokingham Borough Council's tree planting scheme, part of its programme to address the climate emergency. With funding from the Woodland Trust, nearly 1,000 trees have recently been planted in our parish.

I am the new Chair of the Parish Council, having been voted in at the May Council Meeting. This followed the resignation from the Parish Council in April of Jonathan Wheelwright, who was previously Chair. I'm no stranger to the role, having been Chair between 2018 and 2022, but this was not a homecoming I was expecting. The baton I passed on turned into a boomerang! I will be known to many, having been a resident of Swallowfield for over 30 years and a parish councillor since September 2010 - gosh, was it really that long ago?!

On behalf of the Council I would like to thank Jonathan for his contribution, including in the area of planning and in the demanding role of Chair. Being Chair occupies a lot of time as you need to keep abreast of all the activities and projects in which the Council is involved - indeed I have heard it said and have come to know from experience that it can easily become a full-time job if you let it!

Our vice chair, David Lamont, also resigned recently so there are now two vacancies needing to be filled. David was instrumental in modernising our branding and communications, including a new logo, our website and newsletter. Our office IT systems, web hosting and email were also brought into line with modern technology. I hope you agree that this was a fantastic job and frankly long overdue. He has also made a valued contribution in other areas including the bus service and environment. I would like to thank David on behalf of the Council.

As there hasn't been a call for an election, these councillor vacancies can now be filled by cooption, whereby the Council appoints its new members. We are looking for applications from enthusiastic community-minded individuals who can contribute some of their time and expertise; if you are at all interested, please talk to Liz, our clerk, or any councillor in the first instance. Don't just assume that someone else will take on the role and so there is no point. Without a full complement of committed councillors there is no way that the Council can continue to achieve all the good work that it has been doing.

It is all too easy to complain about local issues, many of which are outside the direct control of the Council. The Council is always open to new approaches and constructive suggestions and relies on and we encourage residents to engage directly with us. The Council works hard to promote such issues within the organisations that have the powers to implement a solution.

It has been an eventful time since the last newsletter. The coronation of King Charles III was a very special occasion indeed. The last coronation happened in the year I was born! Some residents of Riseley organised an event on the recreation ground to mark the occasion. More on this inside.

Every year we hold an Annual Parish Meeting, which is convened by the Chair. This year, the event took place on 10 May, just 24 hours after I was elected as Chair. Needless to say this presented a few challenges. It is not a formal Council meeting but rather an opportunity to report to residents on work undertaken during the year, to present and discuss topics of interest and be a forum to talk to residents informally over drinks and refreshments. The meeting was well attended and there was some lively discussion. The main topics for discussion were the planning system and our proposal that the community should develop a Neighbourhood Plan. We know that whenever a planning application is submitted to WBC for a large housing development in our locality this galvanises people to action. However, by then the opportunity to influence the outcome is diminished. A Neighbourhood Plan can help to address this. If the community is to produce a Neighbourhood Plan, it requires the commitment of a significant team of residents. It is not something that is done FOR you by the Parish Council, it has to be done BY you. Please contact Cllr Simon Taylor if you think you could help in any way, no matter how small.

There have been changes amongst key groups that use our buildings. The Tennis Club and Pre-School both have new management committees and Pam Wright has declared her intention to retire as manager of the Tea Room. Pre-School is taking action to extend its appeal to a wider group of parents and we wish them well in that endeavour.

Looking ahead, here are some events to go into your diary: National Garden Scheme open gardens – 4 June; the Church Fete – 10 June; Farley Hall Horse Trials – 23-25 June; and the Swallowfield Show - 27-28 August.

The prolonged heatwave and drought last July took its toll on many shrubs and trees which haven't survived. I hope that this year we can all look forward to a warm and pleasant summer without the extremes of climate that we experienced last year.

Rewilding Project Gets Underway

The Parish Council, with support from members of the local community, has been working with Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) on a project to enhance biodiversity locally. It is planned to plant native trees and hedgerow in the Parish Council-owned Van Demans field – an 11-acre field between Part Lane and the Devil's Highway which historically has been used for grazing horses. This new public space for the enjoyment of residents will commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III. The planting, tree protection and maintenance during establishment (a period of two to three years) and the associated costs will be covered by WBC, in association with the Woodland Trust. The Parish Council is investigating with WBC whether the site can be used to generate Biodiversity Net Gain units which can be sold on to developers, with the revenue being put towards the ongoing maintenance and management of the site. The first step is to commission a baseline assessment which will be carried out during the summer.

The Government is introducing a Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) requirement on developers. BNG is a way to contribute to the recovery of nature while developing land. It is making sure the habitat for wildlife is in a better state than it was before development. Under the Environment Act 2021. from November this year every planning permission granted (with some exemptions) will need to demonstrate a BNG of 10%. This can be delivered on-site or off-site either on the developer's own land or through the purchase of BNG units from a land manager. Local Planning Authorities (LPAs) will have to approve a biodiversity net gain plan for the development before work can start. A market is being set up enabling biodiversity-enhanced sites to sell units in BNG to developers throughout England, facilitated by the LPA, as a way for them to comply with this obligation. BNG will be measured using Defra's biodiversity metric.



The detailed planting and landscaping plans are being compiled and neighbours are being consulted. Plans are being made for planting to take place in the forthcoming planting season from November this year.

The Parish Council is also exploring the possibility of creating a pond or ponds on the site that would provide new habitat suited to Great Crested Newts and other pond-dwelling wildlife.

A further aim is to get the site registered as a Local Nature Reserve (LNR). LNRs are statutory sites and are given protection against damaging operations and also some protections against development on and around them. Swallowfield Meadow and The Marshes in Riseley Common are already LNRs.

The Art group has been busy this term with a combination of tutored and untutored sessions. Amongst the subjects covered in our tutored sessions, we studied abstract flowers in acrylic paints and architectural line and wash with pen and watercolour.

It's fair to say that the former subject elicited some strong reactions! As usual, trying to 'loosen up' to paint in an abstract style proved a challenge, as our natural inclination is to fiddle with detail and to adopt a more photo-realistic result. The two paintings shown are as a result of a great deal of groaning and trying again.

The line and wash lessons proved a more popular subject, though the discipline of perspective using multiple vanishing points was definitely challenging. A vanishing point is the point at which receding parallel lines viewed in perspective appear to converge. The views we studied and drew were of a Venetian canal and proved to be excellent learning exercises. The initial drawing was done using a waterproof ink pen and then colour and shadows were added using watercolour paint.

We are entering the pre-Swallowfield Show phase, preparing material and finishing work off ready to exhibit in the Art Group marquee or to enter into the art section of the horticultural competition.


FARLEY HILL CRICKET CLUB

The allotment dried out a bit in April after a very waterlogged winter, but the rain of early May has set us back again. The water table is very high, and it doesn't take much rain to turn the site back into a muddy bog! But the intrepid plot-holders on the site haven't been deterred and there is much new growth across the site, including from plants that must have been underwater for months.

We held our open morning on Saturday 13 May and are always very pleased to welcome visitors to the site. This year's event was themed around the Coronation -"Of Cabbages & Kings"!

There are many jobs to do in the early summer:

Outdoor sowing

Beetroot, broccoli, carrots and courgettes can all be sown now. Kale, kohl rabi, marrows, oriental leaves, peas, pumpkins, runner beans, swedes, Swiss chard and turnips, salad leaves, spring onions and radishes too.

Plant out seedlings

Your seedlings can be planted out - aubergines, brussel sprouts, cabbages, cauliflowers, celeriac, chilli peppers, courgettes, summer squashes, French beans, kale, leeks, marrows, pumpkins, sprouting broccoli, sweetcorn and peppers. Don't forget to protect your seedlings from any late frost.

Time to harvest early crops New season early potatoes, peas and broad beans will be ready to harvest. Pick strawberries and gooseberries; harvest beetroot and summer salads.

JOBS FOR EARLY SUMMER

- mulch and water regularly
- check your netting is secure and will not entrap wildlife
- feed tomatoes being grown under cover when the first fruits form
- continue to earth up potatoes
- cut down broad beans and peas to the ground after the crops have finished but leave the roots in the ground as
- feed asparagus after the final pickings (around the 21st June) but leave the plants to grow until autumn
- remove raspberry suckers and tie in blackberries
- check for pests and diseases.

Hard work of the **Council and its** partners recognised

There was great news for Wokingham Borough Council and many partner organisations, as the hard work of officers and colleagues across the Borough has been recognised with not just one, but four nominations in the national MJ Achievement Awards. The highest number of nominations from any single council this year.

One of the most prestigious awards for local government, the MJ Awards were established to recognise best practice and excellence in delivering services as well as innovation in supporting local communities. The awards also celebrate projects where local authorities have worked closely with partners, including other professional organisations, the voluntary sector, businesses and the local community to deliver great outcomes for all.

Villagers and Council see off 'inappropriate' homes plan

I know that residents are concerned about excessive building in our villages, particularly with the application by Croudace Homes being reviewed for Trowes Lane/Charlton Lane by WBC planners. I was particularly pleased that a proposal for about 200 new homes in Hurst, which many residents opposed, will not be going ahead after Wokingham Borough Council's decision to refuse the scheme was upheld by a planning inspector.

The applicant wanted to develop a 10.68-hectare plot east of Lodge Road, currently used for grazing. The site lies outside Hurst village, beside its boundary. and the Council argued strongly that this "huge bolton extension" would have harmed its rural character.

Policies recognise Hurst is an appropriate place for limited development, but oppose larger developments and generally building outside

the village boundaries to preserve its character and identity, much as is the case with our villages, such as Swallowfield.

The Council welcomes this decision as it shows that our planning policies, which guide where development should and should not take place, can withstand independent scrutiny.

The inspector said: "Even though the council is currently unable to demonstrate a deliverable five-year housing land supply, I don't consider it reasonable to ignore the bigger picture, which is a very strong likelihood that the Council will achieve a significant oversupply.

To my mind, this does not signify a council that is failing in terms of housing provision, but rather one which is performing well and managing to boost the supply of housing over that which it planned for."

The scheme was opposed by Hurst Parish Council, who instructed its own legal counsel and appeared at the inquiry as a main party, which included giving formal evidence. Wokinaham Borough Council welcomes this confirmation that it can defend the Borough from unsuitable, speculative development, even when it can't technically show a five-year housing land supply. It still has a valid local plan that runs until 2026 and will cite this decision if it is challenged in this way again.

In recent months WBC has been pressing for changes to the national planning system, arguing it should take in the bigger picture and allow past overprovision of housing to be considered when looking ahead. The Council continues arguing for a fundamental shift in national planning policy one that looks at the national and regional picture, deciding where housing and related development is most fairly allocated to benefit everyone.

As I write, summer is around the corner to give us warmer weather. I hope that you all have an excellent summer break.
