# An Update on the Croudace Homes Application and Appeal

Most residents of Swallowfield Parish, and certainly those of Swallowfield Village, are painfully aware of the threat to our community from the application by Croudace Homes to build 81 houses on the land west of Trowes Lane and north of Charlton Lane, commonly known as the 'mint' field. If allowed, this application could open the floodgates to further development on other land not currently allocated in the local plan for housing development by WBC. Around twelve such plots of land between Swallowfield and Riseley have been offered up by landowners as being available for potential development in response to a call for sites by WBC. Such unplanned development without associated local infrastructure would irreversibly damage the character of our

villages, our green spaces and our lifestyle.

In January, the Croudace Homes planning application was refused by WBC's Planning Committee on the grounds (inter alia) of 'unsustainability'. In late March, Croudace Homes lodged an appeal with the Planning Inspectorate against WBC's decision.

WBC has confirmed that to support its defence against this appeal, it has instructed a barrister, Matt Lewin, to act on its behalf. Last year this barrister successfully acted on its behalf in a similar appeal against WBC's refusal of an application for a development of 200 homes in Hurst, which was dismissed by the Inspector. On the current appeal, WBC has also appointed a planning consultant familiar with WBC planning policies and a landscape witness to assist in the preparation and presentation of its case.

The Parish Council initially applied to the Planning Inspectorate for Rule 6 status which would have accorded it equal standing to the other main parties (appellant and WBC). However, further dialogue with the Inspectorate and others established that it would not be possible to meet the criteria and deadlines for documenting and presenting its own case.

A highly motivated group of Swallowfield residents, the Swallowfield Community Action Group (SCAG), concluded that the priority was to gather vital, verifiable evidence of the unsustainability of further large-scale development in our village.

## **Bins and waste** on parish land

Let me say right up front that I understand that our open spaces are used by people from outside our villages, and also that most users are considerate, and we all appreciate your efforts to keep our open areas clean, tidy and attractive. In this article I can only address the audience of this parish newsletter.

Residents are rightly concerned about litter and waste (including dog waste) in the parish. The Parish Council provides and/or services 24 waste bins on parish land. These bins are well used, and in some cases misused. Bins are provided in:

Farley Hill King George V Playing Field (these bins are actually owned by Wokingham BC, but our Parish Warden empties them).

Foxes Run, Swallowfield

Nutbean Lane burial ground (serviced)

**Riseley Recreation Ground** 

Riseley Village Green (serviced) Swallowfield Meadow

Swallowfield Recreation Ground and Parish Hall grounds

Most of the bins are unlidded (and unfortunately suitable lids are not available for them). This means anything in them gets wet, slimy, and horrible if it rains.

There are three lidded bins designated for dog waste (one on Swallowfield Rec, one on Swallowfield Meadow and one on Riseley Rec) and we have recently replaced these with new bright red bins which are 50% larger, but, with the increase in dog ownership over

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the last few years, most of the other bins are also now used for dog waste as well (which is acceptable but not preferred).

The designated dog waste bins and the bin on Foxes Run are emptied fortnightly by a contractor, at a cost of approx. £900 a year. Other bins are emptied by our Parish Warden. So, the cost of emptying these bins runs to several thousand pounds a year. As you can imagine it is a messy and unpleasant job.

All these bins are intended for incidental waste, not for household waste. As such people should not bring waste to the bins from elsewhere. Recent examples have been: carrier bags full of used dog poo bags; carrier bags of cat litter; carrier bags of bottles and cans; a jar of pickled beetroot! We ask you to only use the bins for their intended purpose.

If the bin is full, please let us know (clerk@swallowfieldpc.gov.uk), and if possible don't add to it.

Note that dog waste can be disposed of in your normal bins at home, and this will still be the case with WBC's revised waste policy to be introduced this summer.

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**Reflections** from the Chair

# Welcome

Welcome to the summer edition of the Parish Newsletter. The Annual Parish Council Meeting in May is the time when the council elects its Chair, Vice Chair and the Chair of its Planning Committee for the coming year. I was pleased to be re-elected as Chair. I will be known to many having been a resident of Swallowfield for over 30 years and a Swallowfield Parish Councillor since 2010. I now have the dubious privilege of being the second longest serving Parish Councillor, second only to Margaret McDonald.

It is with regret that Ian Fullerton resigned from the council in April. Ian was our Chair of Planning and championed our speed watch initiative. His commitment and enthusiasm will be greatly missed. Simon Taylor is our newly elected Chair of Planning. Following Ian's resignation, a councillor vacancy exists and as there hasn't been a call for an election this can now be filled by co-option. The council hopes to co-opt at its June meeting.

The council has elected Paul Shultz to be Vice Chair. The Vice Chair stands in for the Chair when he is unavailable.

The parish caretaker, Derek Norris, has announced his intention to retire and the recruitment of his successor has commenced.

Another significant change relates to our Borough Council representation. Swallowfield is now part of a larger ward - Spencers Wood and Swallowfield. The ward includes the western half of Shinfield Parish and extends from Spencers Wood up into Three Mile Cross and Grazeley. The new ward is represented by three ward councillors - Cllr Stuart Munro who formerly represented our ward, Cllr Dave Edmonds and Cllr Catherine Glover. I have invited our newly elected councillors to the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) on 19th June so that they can introduce themselves to residents. All three live in the former Swallowfield ward.

The APM is on a later date than usual because of the Local Council elections. It is not a formal council meeting but rather an opportunity to report to residents on work undertaken during the year, to present and discuss topics of interest and be a forum to talk with residents informally over drinks and refreshments.

This year we have just one main topic – the planning appeal lodged by Croudace Homes against WBC's refusal of their planning application for 81 homes on land west of Trowes Lane and north of Charlton Lane. The Parish Council objected strongly to this application and was delighted at the decision by WBC's Planning Committee to refuse the application. If this application is allowed to go ahead on appeal, there is little doubt that it will open the floodgates to many other opportunistic applications on agricultural land in the parish.

Looking ahead, here are some events to go into your diary: the Church Fete 8th June; Annual Parish Meeting 19th June; Farley Hall Horse Trials 21st – 23rd June; and the Swallowfield Show 25th - 26th August.

After the wet and unsettled weather this spring, I hope we can all look forward to a warm and pleasant summer.

Parish Council has opted to support the SCAG as "Interested Parties" which will (at the discretion of the Inspector) be able to speak at the inquiry. There are limited opportunities to speak and be cross-examined at the inquiry so this should be coordinated with the Parish Council and the group to ensure this is managed to best effect.

The SCAG has been working to defend our parish from inappropriate development ever since the draft "Local Plan Update" was announced in 2022. Thanks to their prompting, over 400 consultation responses of opposition were submitted to WBC following

the initial planning application and some 300 parishioners highlighted the strength of local opposition by attending the Planning Committee meeting in January. Following the lodging of the appeal, additional responses have been submitted to the Planning Inspectorate.

The appeal will be heard at Shute End, Wokingham, starting at 10am on Wednesday 26th June and lasting 5 days. Residents opposed to the development should make every effort to attend the appeal hearing on the opening day and thereafter if possible.

Through a further leaflet drop, the SCAG has encouraged residents to attend at least one session of the appeal hearing. In addition, all the households in Swallowfield Village were asked to respond to a survey aimed at providing irrefutable evidence of the sustainability challenges we all face. Thank you to everyone who completed the survey.

The Parish Council has assisted this initiative through provision of technical support and council resources, and by facilitating contact with key personnel at WBC.

A further update will be provided at the Annual Parish Meeting on 19th June. Please come along to show your concern and learn how you can continue to support Swallowfield at the appeal hearing.

## **Rubbish** & Recycling



Wokingham Borough Council currently recycle 55% of our household waste (up from 34% in 2016) but need to do better to meet the Governments expectations and its own climate emergency goals.

62% of the average blue bag were recyclable materials. If everyone recycled all they could the recycling rate would be 70%.

The next page shows how you can achieve this.

### **CHANGES MID AUG 2024**

Your collection day won't change but general waste will be collected one week and recycling the next.


Black Bins will be delivered over the next few weeks, it will hold 180 litres (two full blue bags' worth of rubbish). Only one bin will be emptied

Do not use them until mid-august, a calendar showing which of your collections fall in each week will be delivered to each household before then.

### SWALLOWFIELD ART GROUP

Over the last few months we have painted a variety of subjects, some in watercolour and some in acrylic. Each subject is chosen to either introduce us to new skills or to practise the techniques we already know.

We painted a cityscape in acrylics and a rainy street scene in watercolours. The styles of the paintings were quite different but, in both, we needed to depict buildings and reflections. Different media sometimes have opposing qualities that require additional skills, or the subject may demand a very different treatment. As an example, painting a portrait of a child requires much more emphasis on light and subtle tonal values because, compared to an adult face with its lines, wrinkles and shadows, there is a lot less detail to help create a likeness.

As amateur artists, working in class gives the opportunity to improve our range of techniques and step outside our comfort zones. Through new experiences, we find out what media we enjoy working in, what papers we prefer (it's truly amazing the difference that the quality of paper makes), what styles we are good at and what subjects we enjoy.

If you are a beginner or have some experience and maybe interested in joining us, we meet at Swallowfield Parish Hall on Mondays from 2pm to 4pm (during term times). A warm welcome awaits.

The weather is finally starting to pick up and it is full steam ahead down at the Calico Field. Our tender plants are looking green and healthy, and we have had two very successful working parties in the last couple of months to trim the hedges and verges, spread wood chip and tidy the raised beds, followed by well-deserved tea and cake. We had a productive evening building a fence around our new pond and are looking forward to seeing the biodiversity it attracts.

Our big news is that for the first time this year we will have opened the allotments on 2nd June in support of the National Garden Scheme. At the time of writing, this is only a week away and we have all been working hard at our plots to make sure they are shipshape for our visitors. I'm sure it will be an inspiring day.

Looking ahead, we are planning a Harvest Festival on 21st September to showcase the bounty we are growing and to raise essential funds to keep the site in order, so please do come and visit us then.

June will signal the end of Spring and the beginning of Summer, and as the month progresses, our plants are enjoying a steadily increasing amount of sunlight. There are some top tasks to be getting on with at this time of year:

- Harvest new season early potatoes, peas, broad beans and summer salads.
- Sow seeds for vegetables, salads and herbs to be picked
- Seedlings can be planted out frost has passed.
- Peas, brassicas and fruit bushes them against hungry birds.
- Weeding will need to be done regularly, along with watering

## **LOCAL HISTORY** SOCIETY

We have had two meetings so far this year with two different but fascinating talks.

### Thursday 18th April 2024. A HISTORY OF HUNTLEY & PALMERS

Presented by Anne Garrison (Museum of English Rural Life (MERL))

The company was formed by Joseph Huntley in 1822. It became one of the world's first global brands (chiefly led by George Palmer who joined in 1841). It was at one time the world's largest biscuit factory, making over 200 different types of biscuit which were sold in elaborately decorated biscuit tins. By 1900, the company's products were sold in 172 different countries and their global reach saw advertising posters featuring scenes from around the world. Over the years, the company was also known as "J. Huntley & Son" and "Huntley & Palmer". Biscuit production in Reading ceased in 1976.

Since 2008, the Huntley and Palmers name has been owned by the Freeman family, with three generations in the biscuit business. Their aim is to bring the name of Huntley and Palmers back into the mainstream, with a range of products targeting different market sectors, and including, once again, biscuit tins.

The talk was well received by an appreciative audience; several questions were asked and expertly answered by Anne.

### Thursday 16th May 2024. **GRAFFITI FOUND IN BERKSHIRE CHURCHES**

Presented by James Peddle

James introduced us to the fascinating story of what and why graffiti can be found in our churches. It was a fascinating insight into the people who left the graffiti and their motivation, this is now seen as a comment and reflection on what was happening in their lives at the time. James is member of a Project team "Berkshire Medieval Graffiti Survey" commissioned by the Berkshire Archaeological Society. This will create opportunities for church communities and residents to learn more about graffiti in general and more specifically, the graffiti in their local church. It is hoped that documenting the location, types and interpretation of the graffiti will stimulate a new area of interest in the churches. It is also anticipated that this new knowledge and interest will build a lasting appreciation of the existence, and preservation of the graffiti, and contribute to and extend the interest in the local history of the villages, through the discovery of names, dates, initials and pictures (amongst other things).

Russell Players once again hosted an entertaining evening consisting of a tasty light supper and a play that captivated the audience's attention across three nights. 'Death by Detective (Corpsed by a Copper)' by David Pemberton was directed by Mitch Mitchell and demonstrated the talents of the Russell Players' actors and backstage crew.

Clever casting enabled the characters of the play to shine to the best of their ability. Harriet Brush (Sheila Partington), a Doctor of Psychology helped narrate the story together with Donald Bucket (Trish Harris), a detective who would give Sherlock Holmes a run for his money. Alongside these characters, you had Helen Stoner (Lisa Johnston), a young woman in distress who expertly retold the story leading up to her sister's murder involving seamless costume and scene changes. Mrs. Dobson and Julia Stoner were both characterised well by Louisa Nozay, especially when Julia met her death and Mrs. Dobson suffered from a fir tree allergy. Dr Grimsby Deadwood was skilfully portrayed by Glyn Marshall who adopted a convincing intimidating persona. His untimely death was celebrated (albeit quietly) by all.

The hard work that had been put into producing this play was evident. The costumes were a delight, the lighting and sound operation and scene changes were excellent throughout. Well done to all involved and to Mitch Mitchell for directing an enjoyable play.





### HOW TO COPE IN THE HOT WEATHER

As we move into the summer months, most of us are glad for some warmer weather. However, the hot weather can cause some health risks. During a heatwave, the main risks are:

- Not drinking enough water (dehydration)
- Overheating, which can make symptoms worse for people who already have problems with their heart or breathing.
- Heat exhaustion and heatstroke.

Those most at risk are the elderly, those that live on their own or in a care home, those with long-term illnesses, those on multiple medicines and those that find it difficult to keep cool such as babies and young children.



### **USEFUL TIPS**

- 1. Keep out of the heat if you can.
- 2. If you must go outside, stay in the shade especially between 11am and 3pm, wear sunscreen, a hat and light clothes, and avoid exercise or activity that makes you hotter.
- 3. Cool yourself down. Have cold food and drinks, avoid alcohol, caffeine and hot drinks, and have a cool shower or put cool water on your skin or clothes.
- 4. Keep your living space cool. Close windows during the day and open them at night when the temperature outside has gone down. Electric fans can help if the temperature is below 35 degrees. Check the temperature of rooms, especially where people at high risk live and sleep


